HLL Doctoral Student Quim Solias Wins Guiliano Fellowship!



During his research stay in Naples funded by the prestigious College of Arts and Sciences Edward Guiliano '78 PhD Global Fellowship, Quim Solias conducted archival work on late 16th-and early 17th-century documents at different Neapolitan libraries and archives such as the National Library and the Fondazione Banco di Napoli.

This research, carried out in collaboration with the Istituto di Scienze del Patrimonio Culturale (ISP-CNR), was for a paper presented at the 2025 Renaissance Society of America Conference, and will inform both his doctoral thesis and a forthcoming peerreviewed article.

The HLL Invita: Fall 2024 Series



Prof. Victoriano Roncero-López Publishes New Book





Elena Davidiak: Mentoring, Research, and Internship Supervision


